

Despite receiving little media attention, school boards wield a lot of power. For example, school boards have the power to make budgeting, policy, and curricula decisions, which not only have a big impact on a classroom environment, but also help decide the values students receive alongside their formal education.

WHAT DO SCHOOL BOARDS DO?

- They decide their district's policies and rules. FOR EXAMPLE: Should there be police in our schools?
- They make hiring decisions for their district. FOR EXAMPLE: Who will be the superintendent overseeing day-to-day operations?
- They set their district's educational goals.
 FOR EXAMPLE: This school district will develop a facilities plan that meets the long-range needs of students.
- They decide which courses are offered in their district.
 FOR EXAMPLE: Should teachers be banned from teaching the history of race in America?
- They can reorganize their district's schools.
 FOR EXAMPLE: When the population changes, a school board may have to decide which schools close and which ones stay open.
- They can buy and sell the district's school property. FOR EXAMPLE: If a school is closed, does the board sell the property? Where does that money go?

WHAT MAKES FOR A GOOD SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER?

While there is no one way to be a good school board member, the Georgia School Boards Association recommends school board members be:

- Dedicated to providing every child in their community with a good basic education.
- Interested in working collaboratively with staff, parents, and other members of the community.
- Engaged with all the issues that affect a school district, rather than one overriding interest.
- Representative of the diversity of the community.
- Willing to be held accountable.

To research candidates for yourself, consult local nonpartisan organizations such as the League of Women Voters (<u>www.vote411.org</u>) and a candidate's own website or social media accounts as you make this important decision.



DO YOU QUALIFY TO RUN FOR A SCHOOL BOARD SEAT?*

Too often, school board seats are uncontested—or, even worse, left unfilled. The good news, however, is that Georgia's qualifications are not especially restrictive. **To run for a school board seat, you must:**

- Be at least 21 years of age.**
- Be a citizen of the State of Georgia.
- Be a registered voter.
- Be a resident of the school district in which you seek to be elected.
- File an affidavit with the elections superintendent confirming you have read and agreed to follow the local school board's code of ethics and conflict of interest policies.
- *Local laws may require additional qualifications ** Local laws may lower the minimum age to 18 years
