April 25 (Mon)	DEADLINE TO REGISTER TO VOTE
May 2 (Mon)	EARLY VOTING BEGINS* Polls open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
May 7 (Sat)	SATURDAY EARLY VOTING
May 13 (Fri)	Last day to submit absentee ballot application.
May 14 (Sat)	SATURDAY EARLY VOTING
May 20 (Fri)	EARLY VOTING ENDS Polls open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
May 23 (Mon)	DEADLINE TO REGISTER TO VOTE in the General Primary Runoff for Federal Races.**
May 24 (Tues)	ELECTION DAY Polls open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
May 27 (Fri)	Deadline to cure provisional ballot and rejected absentee ballot issues.
June 21 (Tues)	SPECIAL RUNOFF ELECTION DAY (if necessary).

*Early voting dates, hours, availability of Sunday voting, and availability of absentee ballot drop boxes may vary depending on your county. Visit bit.ly/GaVotersInfo for county information.

** The deadline to register to vote in federal runoff races is different from the deadline for state races.

WHAT IDs ARE ACCEPTABLE?

GA Driver's License, even if expired.	Federally Issued ID — including U.S. Passport or Military Photo ID.
Free ID Card issued by County Registrar or Georgia Department of Driver Services.	Employee photo ID from any branch, department, agency, or entity of the Federal, Georgia, or local government.
Any State or Federal Government-Issued Photo ID, including from Georgia public colleges, universities, and technical colleges.	Tribal Photo ID.

WHAT IF I DON'T HAVE ONE OF THE ACCEPTABLE FORMS OF PHOTO ID?

The State of Georgia offers a free ID card that can be issued at any county registrar's office or Department of Driver Services Office. Visit bit.ly/GAVoterIDInfo to learn more.

Absentee Ballot

Any voter can request an absentee ballot. No excuse is needed. Simply complete and submit the application to request an absentee ballot. Then, return your completed absentee ballot by mail or at a drop off location in your county. Request, complete, and send your absentee ballot to your county registrar as soon as possible to avoid issues. Visit bit.ly/GaAbsenteeVoting to learn more about absentee ballots in Georgia. Under Georgia law, you have a right to:

- Vote if you are in line by the time polls close.
- Vote free from intimidation.
- Vote and cast a regular ballot even if you are on the "inactive voters" list. In fact, voting is one of the ways to return to active status.
- Cast a vote by provisional ballot if there is uncertainty regarding your registration status or eligibility.
- Avoid waiting in line if you are 75 or older or have a disability. Tell a poll worker that you must be at the front of the line due to your age and disability. Contact your county office for more info about accessibility options.
- Get help voting if you need it because you are blind, disabled, illiterate or can't read English. Anyone can help you so long as they are not your employer or union representative.

School Boards

School boards wield a lot of power — they make budget, policy, and curricula decisions, which have a big impact on a classroom environment.

County Commissions

The county commission governs a county, establishing policies for the health, safety, and welfare of a county's residents. They set a county's budget and decide how and where to spend tax dollars.
